Established in 1887 (as the “Romanisch-Englisches Seminar”), this is not only the oldest, but also the largest English Department in Switzerland and one of the larger departments in the German-speaking part of Europe. We are proud to offer a wide range of courses in both English literature and linguistics, with a broad coverage for historical studies in both fields (including mediaeval literature and language history from Old English to the 21st century).

Our department has eight professorships (given this is Switzerland, we have parity and four in each field) and – until the end of January 2021 – an additional assistant professorship for Global literatures. With a total staff of over 50 we offer Bachelor, Master and PhD programs and are committed to high standards in research and teaching, which is evidenced by our research output, regular course evaluations from students and particularly the fact that our students are regularly awarded the faculty’s prestigious semester prizes for best papers.

We are strongly committed to cooperation with other departments within our faculty (e.g. in the cross-disciplinary course programs in linguistics and literature) and across Switzerland and Europe. We have benefited from the Bologna 2020 reform to carefully design our course programs and guide students, both at Bachelor and Master levels, through their studies in an efficient way while at the same time leaving room for specialization in various areas. We firmly believe it is paramount to make teaching methods research-based so students make most of their time in class and acquire methodological expertise and analytical skills.

Information on the Bachelor Programs in English

1 Bachelor in English Literature and Linguistics

1.1 Aims of the Program

Anglophone literature, media, and culture are key influences across the globe, and English remains the dominant language of international exchange. The UZH Bachelor programs in English Literature and Linguistics will appeal to students wishing to explore the variety and complexity of these cultural formations.

The programs aim to equip students with the theoretical and methodological tools needed to analyze and engage with the language and culture of the English-speaking world from a historical perspective, as well as with a focus on contemporary issues and debates.

Students will learn how to approach linguistic data and analysis in a structured, scientific way, and they will acquire the necessary skills to develop sustained critical interpretations of both literary and audio-visual material.

The programs also allow students to improve their proficiency in English, with a particular focus on academic discourse and writing. An emphasis is placed on reading and understanding challenging theoretical texts, as well as an in-depth awareness of regional issues (particularly in the UK and the USA, but also touching on themes and topics from the entire English-speaking world).

The Bachelor programs in English Literature and Linguistics prepare students for later employment in a range of areas, particularly education, editing, journalism, PR, advertising, marketing, film, translation, administration, and diplomacy, as well as for advanced studies at Master level.

1.2 Difference(s) between Major and Minor

The Bachelor Minor program comprises all the core elements of English studies as taught at UZH: Linguistics, Literature, and Language Skills and Culture. More specifically, students have to complete all mandatory modules (so-called *P-Module*) and one core elective (one of the ten Bachelor Seminar modules from the module group "English Literature").

Compared to the Minor, the Bachelor Major program offers students a much broader range of choice from within the field of English studies, as well as the option of taking modules from other UZH Bachelor programs (in the module group "Transferable Skills").

Both Bachelor programs provide students with all the skills that they need to continue their studies at Master level, either as a Major or as a Minor (i.e. there are no additional requirements even if one changes from the Bachelor Minor to the Master Major).

Table 1: Types of Documents

Document	Explanation
<i>Rahmenverordnung</i>	The <i>Rahmenverordnung über die Bachelor- und Masterstudiengänge an der Philosophischen Fakultät der Universität Zürich (RVO PhF)</i> constitutes the legal framework for the Bachelor and Master programs at the UZH Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences.
<i>Studienordnung der Studienprogramme der Philosophischen Fakultät</i>	The <i>Studienordnung</i> implements and details the legal framework outlined in the <i>Rahmenverordnung</i> . It consists of a general section (<i>Allgemeiner Teil</i>), which concerns the regulations that apply to all programs at the UZH Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, and of several appendices, each of which concerns one particular study program (<i>programmspezifische Anhänge</i> , e.g. for English Literature and Linguistics).
<i>Programmspezifische Anhänge zur Studienordnung</i>	The <i>programmspezifische Anhänge</i> outline the detailed regulations for each study program. The core element is the study plan, which contains information concerning the structure of the program as well as the program requirements. These requirements detail which modules students need/may choose to complete their studies in this particular program.
<i>Modulkatalog</i>	The <i>Modulkatalog</i> outlines all modules offered as part of a particular program. Some of these modules are offered on a regular basis; others are offered on a semester-to-semester basis. For a full overview of modules offered in any given semester, students may consult the online course catalog: https://studentservices.uzh.ch
<i>Mustercurriculum</i>	The <i>Mustercurriculum</i> outlines one particular way in which one can complete the program requirements. Note that there are other ways of organizing your studies (cf. section on sample timetables below).
<i>Wegleitung zu einzelnen Programmen</i>	The <i>Wegleitung</i> or study guide intends to explain the regulations for one particular program. The current document provides students with a very rough overview. A more detailed study guide is available on the English Department website: https://www.es.uzh.ch/en/bachelor.html .
